

Policy programme Circular Textiles







25% recycled (post-consumer) / sustainable material in textile products

30% of textile products placed on the Dutch market will be recycled after collection if direct re-use is not possible

2030

50% recycled (post-consumer) / sustainable material in textile products; 30% recycled content and 20% sustainable material





Rebel Group/Tauw vs Modint/InRetail













2025 targets*

Rebel/Tauw

50% re-use and recycling; of which at least 20% re-use and 30% recycling or re-use

of the recycled fraction - 1/4e fiber to fiber

Modint - InRetail

5% re-use in NL 20% re-use outside NL 15% other recycling 5% fiber to fiber recycling

Combined vs separate 50% vs 45%









Fee setting

Rebel Consultancy

Model to set fees

Fee structure in 4 different categories of textile products according to size and weight

Modulated fees to stimulate circularity

Use of recycled post-consumer textile content serves as basis fee modulation

Modint - InRetail

Costs and revenues separate collection determined by independent audit

Fee modulation based on integrated approach; sustainable production chain and stimulating use of recycled content

Companies importing less than € 500k do not pay fee

Fee charged to consumer and visible on price tag







Producers, fashion chains and importers will be responsible for the collection, recycling, reuse and waste phase of the products they market from 2023 onwards

Producers must also finance this logistic system. They bear the costs of waste management, which provides a financial incentive for higher quality clothing. As a result, clothing can be better recycled and reused.

The goal: more reuse, less waste and less pollution in the fashion industry.







